Reading:

Jesus said to his disciples: "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me. In my Father's house there are many dwelling places. Reading:

Jesus told this parable: “Which one of you with a hundred sheep, if he lost one, would fail to leave the ninety-nine in the desert and go after the missing one till he found it? And when he found it, would he not joyfully take it on his shoulders and then, when he got home, call together his friends and neighbours, saying to them, ‘Rejoice with me, I have found my sheep that was lost.’ In the same way, I tell you, there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner repenting than over ninety-nine upright people who have no need of repentance.” (Luke 15:3-7)

Sunday 30 April

Morning Sunday service in a church in your host neighbourhood

Small group meeting

Note: depending on the time of the service, this meeting can take place either beforehand or afterwards. Participants need to be at the city-centre lunch distribution for 1:00-1:30pm.

In many churches the story of Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) is read this morning. In small groups, either before or after the service, listen to it again, with a different person reading each of the characters (narrator, Jesus, Cleopas,...). Share your reflections. Some questions to help:

- In this and several other stories after the resurrection, the disciples do not realise that they are meeting Jesus. Why this discretion/mystery do you think? What does it mean for us today?

- Although the disciples are discouraged they invite Jesus to eat and stay with them. What experience have you had of giving yourself for others and receiving much more? What could we do to root a similar attitude of welcome more deeply in ourselves?

- When they are at table, the disciples thought they were welcoming him. But then they discover that *he* is welcoming them. How in our church communities can we be ready to make the same discovery – in our worship and in our activities?

Forum with bishops and leaders of different churches around brother Alois’ “Call to Church Leaders for 2017”: advancing towards unity, going beyond mere cordiality. *Rev. Mary Stallard, chaplain in a joint Catholic/Anglican secondary school, will encourage Church leaders to share their perspective.* Venue: Quaker Meeting House, B4 6AF [8]

7:30 pm St Martin in the Bull Ring: Evening prayer (song practice from 7:00 pm) *Dr. Rowan Williams, former Archbishop of Canterbury, will speak on "Christian faith and friendship with those of other religions".*

Reading:

Jesus said, "The eye is the lamp of the body. Therefore, if your eye is healthy, your whole body will be full of light. But if your eye is bad, your whole body will be full of darkness. If then the light in you is darkness, how terrible that darkness will be! (...) Don't judge, so that you won't be judged. You will receive the same judgement you give. Whatever you deal out will be dealt out to you. Why do you see the splinter that's in your brother or sister's eye, but don't notice the log in your own eye? How can you say to your brother or sister, 'Let me take the splinter out of your eye,' when there's a log in your eye? You deceive yourself! First take the log out of your eye, and then you'll see clearly to take the splinter out of your brother or sister's eye." (Matthew 6:22—7:5)
